Award-winning author and native Oklahoman Rilla
Askew will speak on how her themes of "blood memory" interweave with the work of other premier Oklahoma women writers, historical and contemporary.



"Pulse of blood memory" is Askew's phrase describing unity of familial generations, as well as Oklahoma as a microcosm of America's collective pulse as a nation with its own historical blood memory narrative.

"America is my subject. Oklahoma is the landscape where my stories unfold," Askew says.

Recipient of a 2009 Academy Award in Literature from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, Askew has been honored with a multitude of awards for her novels: the Western Heritage Award (for both *The Mercy Seat* and *Harpsong*), the American Book Award (*Fire in Beulah*), and the Myers Book Award (*Fire in Beulah*). In 2011 she received the Arrell Gibson Lifetime Achievement Award from the Oklahoma Center for the Book.

Her new novel *Kind of Kin* will be published by Ecco Press in January.
